I hope everyone watched the USJC's Member's Forum on October 21, 2021. I have to admit I was a little reluctant to register for the virtual event – Zoom fatigue

being a very real thing. However, I wanted to support the USJC, so I sucked it up, grabbed a caffeinated beverage and braced myself. Instead, not only was I pleasantly surprised and engaged, I was awed! It was a fabulous program.

What particularly stood out for me was the panel discussion "Elevating the Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) community: A view from the Biden Administration" and the USJC's Artists & Creative Affinity Group's performance: Art Heals, Art Unites, Art Transcends.

Moderated by Stephanie Nitahara (ELP 2019), the panel discussion featured Erika Moritsugu, Deputy Assistant to the President and Senior Liaison for AANHPI and Krystal Ka'ai, Executive Director of the White House Initiative on AANHPI. Two things immediately caught my attention: the fact that the AANHPI community even have people in the White House concerned about their issues; and that those people are two amazing women. Outreach and points of access are a big part of what they are trying to do. Rather than make decisions in a bubble, they are holding briefings and roundtable events to talk to members in the community. Krystal's Initiative has 10 Regional Offices throughout the country. I hope one of their roundtable discussions will be in Chicago. One of the most interesting questions Stephanie asked

them was how their identity shaped and influenced their leadership. Both of them felt the disparity between the cultural inclination to "keep quiet" and "don't be the nail sticking out" vs. their passionate activism. As Erika stated, "consensus is not the same as collaboration."

The Artists & Creative Affinity Group video highlighted various USJC members showcasing their talents. I had no idea we had so many talented, creative people in the USJC. What was fascinating was the diversity of the performers and the performances. Taiko with rap, haiku made into song, a musical on the internment.

On a more local level, I would like to give a shout out to **Michael Tanimura**. Mike is being awarded the 2022 Community Service Award by the Japanese/Japanese American community in Chicago! Mike has been an active member of the USJC, the editor of our Midwest newsletter and was a 2012 JALD Delegate. He has also been very active in the JA community: served as President of the JASC; curated

JA exhibits for the Consulate, JASC, Redress Conference; organized the Japan Community Picnic; and volunteered for numerous community organizations (Tohkon Judo, BTC, JASC). It is a well-deserved award and we are very proud to call him a member of the USJC.

The award will be presented at the Asian American Coalition's Lunar New Year Gala on March 12, 2022. This year the event is hosted by the Malaysian Community, and it would be great to see a strong show of support by USJC members at the Gala.

This is my last article as Midwest Chair. I am turning the gavel over to the very capable hands of **Anna Ninoyu**. While it has been a honor and a privilege to serve as Chair to this region, I believe this change in leadership will bring a new focus as well as a strong reengagement by membership.
