Midwest Forum Strengthens U.S.- Japan Relations

The 27th Annual Midwest Forum was held at the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago on June 27 and 28. The Midwest Forum is unique among MOFA Consular offices in the U.S., bringing together the Honorary Consuls for the 10-State region covered by the Chicago Office as well as non-profit organizations with a focus on U.S.-Japan relations such as the collective Japan America Society chapters, the Japanese Chamber of Commerce and Industry of Chicago, the U.S.-Japan Council, and the Japan External Trade Relations Organization, among others.

The purpose of the meeting is to allow parties to report on and discuss Japan-related topics in their geographical areas, as well as gain a better understanding of the current state of Japan-related issues in the Midwest from MOFA's

perspective, in order to discuss those issues more cogently with stakeholders in their communities. Specifically, the CGJC goal is to "develop new and concrete actions to promote understanding of Japan and enhance Japan's profile in the Midwest, as well as strengthen partnerships with Japan."

Moderated for the fourth year by **Bob Kumaki**, also in attendance from the Midwest USJC were **Dayne Kono** (JALD 2010), **Marion Friebus Flaman** (JALD 2013), **Michael Takada** (JALD 2017), and **Lisa Sakai** (JALD 2018) and **Vickie Sakurada Schaepler** (JALD 2019).


Aila Gomi is one of the chairs of the Outreach & Allyship Committee, which aims to strengthen U.S.-Japan ties while confronting systemic inequities.
