

The Toshizo Watanabe Study Abroad Scholarship





About the Scholarship

The Toshizo Watanabe Study Abroad Scholarship provides financial assistance to American undergraduates or graduate students for a semester or year-long study abroad program in Japan. From 2016, a generous endowment gift of \$10 million from Mr. Toshizo (Tom) Watanabe to the U.S.-Japan Council makes it possible to award scholarships to students for whom study abroad would not be possible without financial support. The scholarship program grants awards to recipients in amounts determined by financial need and other qualifications. As part of Watanabe Scholarship's initiative to develop the next generation of leaders, the scholars will have an opportunity to participate in a leadership training program during their scholarship year.



Eligibility Criteria Please visit website for the full list.

- 1. U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- Will be enrolled in an exchange program or credit-bearing course of study at a university in Japan*
- 3. Demonstrates financial need for international study
- 4. Preference will be given to applicants who have been raised by a single parent and/or first generation to go to college/university

*Applicants who have not confirmed a study abroad school or are already enrolled in a Japanese school as a degree-seeking student are eligible. However, scholarship <u>cannot</u> be used for language schools.

How to Apply

All students must complete an online application using the scholarship portal. The following materials comprise the materials that must be submitted in an application for the scholarship. Selection scheduled to be conducted solely on application materials, no interviews.

Frequently Asked Questions

- Q. Are graduate and degree-seeking students eligible for this scholarship?
 - **A.** Yes. However, the scholarship is only for a maximum of one year of support. If you receive it, you may reapply for a second or third year. But please note that there is no guarantee that you will be awarded again.
- **Q.** Can I combine the Watanabe Scholarship with other financial aid I may receive?
 - Yes, you may combine other scholarships with the Watanabe Scholarship up to the full cost of attendance for your study abroad.
- **Q.** If I am selected, how will I receive the scholarship award?
 - **A.** The scholarship award will be paid in one lump-sum, to scholar's institution (either the U.S. or Japanese institution), not to the scholar directly.
