

Groundbreaking Sharing of Family Experiences

Midwest USJC and the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago held an inaugural *Mirrored Lives* program on Jan. 14. This unprecedented program was an exploration and sharing of Japanese family life in the United States and Japan during and immediately after World War II.

Conceived by **Michael Tanimura** and developed in partnership with Consul Sanae Kanno, the goal of *Mirrored Lives* (big thanks to **Anna Ninoyu** for the title!) is to create a sense of mutual understanding and community by sharing family experiences of World War II and its aftermath.

"Government and military actions forced our ancestors to be enemies", Mike said. "Now, generations later, I want us

to cross that gap by talking about how World War II affected our families, here in the U.S. and Japan."

As noted by Deputy Consul-General Naoya Kishi during his welcome remarks, this marked the first time in the Consulate's history to be involved in any event regarding the war and postwar period. "The Consulate believed it would be an ambitious and meaningful step forward to break new ground this

way, and that this would lead to the further building of trust and cooperation between both the Japanese National and Japanese-American sides of the Chicagoland community," he said.

Hosted by the Japanese American Service Committee at it's new building, 58 people – split almost evenly between Japanese Americans whose ancestors had gone through wartime incarceration, and more recent Japanese immigrants, whose ancestors had experienced the war and occupation in Japan – heard a highly condensed history of JA wartime and Chicago resettlement history from local historian **Erik Matsunaga**.

This was followed by a condensed look at civilian wartime and occupation experiences in Japan, presented by Consul Kanno. Longtime Chicagoan Kayoko Kawaguchi – a Shin-Issei known by all attendees – talked about her family experiences in a chat with Consul Kanno. Consulate staffer **Sawako**

Then participants got their bentos and began small group discussions, directed by facilitators. Clinical Psychologist Sayaka Machizawa developed ground rules and trained

discussion facilitators to ensure that there was a safe environment for everyone. Facilitators included Dr. Machizawa, Dr. Nobuko Chikamatsu, **Dr. Marion Friebus-Flaman**, **Jean Fujiu**, Asako Hoichi, Dr. Kenneth Kikuchi, **Bob Kumaki**, **Anna Ninoyu**, and Jacob Rohde.

Jean said, "I felt so honored and grateful to be a part of this initial program to bring the Japanese American and Japanese national community together around our families' experiences during World War II. Even without specific knowledge, we are feeling the impact through the generations. I'm so grateful to Kay Kawaguchi and the others who provided a perspective from the Japanese experience that I wasn't aware of on such a personal level. I hope this type of program will continue."

That feeling was fairly universal among attendees. Everyone turned in an event survey, with 6 Agreeing they would attend another program, and 48 Strongly Agreeing!
